

- Multi-Modal Transportation



General Fund BUDGET

Rates & TAXES

All 2023 budgets are balanced based on the following rates and tax levels:

- No increase to sewer rate = \$8.86 per 1,000 gal.
- No increase to stormwater rate = \$0.75 per
 100 square feet of impervious area
- 1 mill increase to real estate taxes = 16 mills

Since 2018, the Borough's property tax millage rate has remained consistent at 15.0 mills. This 1 mill increase in 2023 will generate an additional \$40,000 increase in General Fund revenue.

CHANGES APPROVED IN 2022

2022-03 - Yard Waste & Accessibility

- allows for increased property maintenance enforcement for walkability, composting and yard waste

2022-04 - Speed Limits & Parking

- establishes speed limits for all Borough streets & alleys
- no parking provisions on S. Washington St at Crowell Ln

2022-05 - Outdoor Swimming Pools & Fencing

- defines outdoor pools and increases fencing requirements

2022-06 - Taxation & Notice Requirements

- establishes procedure for tax collector to waive additional charges if no tax bill is received & waiver requirements met

2022-07 - creates rules & procedures for public meetings & code of ethical behavior for officials of the Borough of Greencastle



Beautification COMMITTEE VOLUNTEERS

The Borough Council is planning to re-establish a Beautification Committee. Prior to disbanding in 2019, this committee was comprised of community members who served to assist the Borough in developing and pursuing initiatives promoting the beautification of the Borough.

Grant Funding Applications

In 2022, the Borough has submitted for 10 grants requesting a total funding amount of \$2,189,404.41.

Grant applications include partnerships with local entities including the Greencastle Area Youth Foundation for improvements at the High Line Train Station and Aura Properties LLC for a large scale renovation project at 6 East Baltimore Street.

Other projects submitted for grant funding include accessibility improvements to the Walter Avenue and Rt. 11 intersection as well as a reconstruction project for North Washington Street.
