

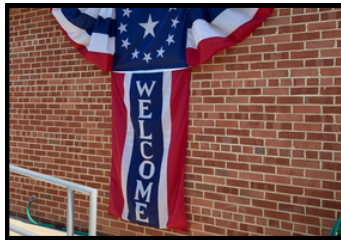

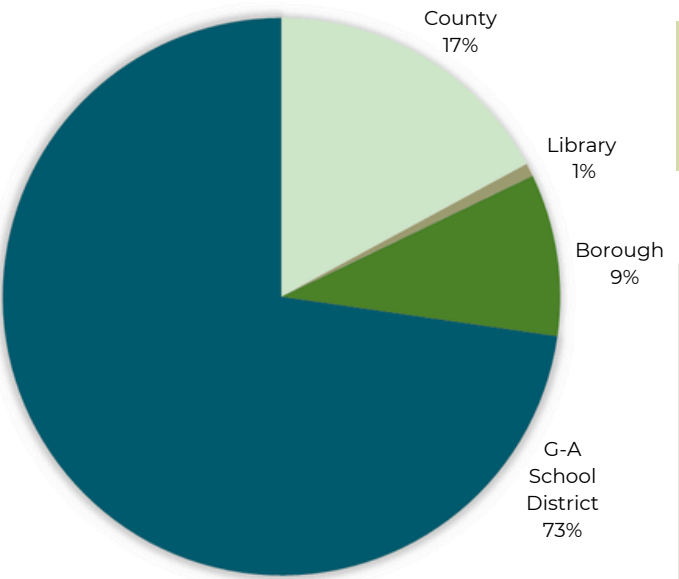

Budget OVERVIEW

The 2025 budgets prioritize maintaining the Borough’s established level of essential services while facilitating the execution of priority projects in alignment with the Borough’s foundational objectives and priorities:

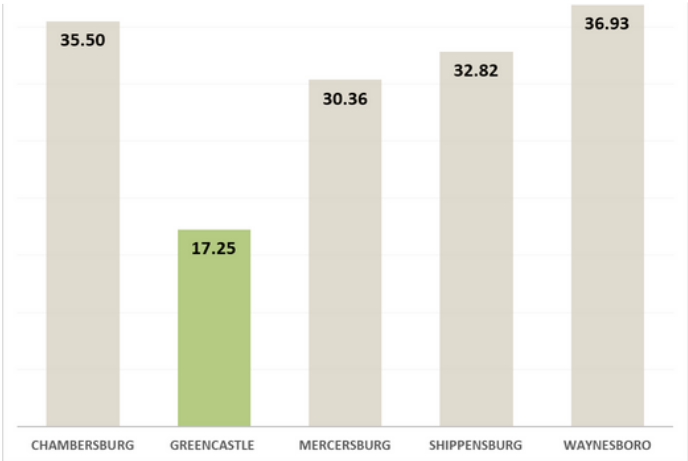
- Ensuring Public Safety

Distribution of Taxes

The above chart displays the distribution of tax monies paid in 2024 by property owners in the Borough of Greencastle. As shown, only a small portion of local tax dollars — just 9¢ of every dollar — went to the Borough. The largest share, 73%, supported the Greencastle-Antrim School District, with the remainder divided between the County and Library. This breakdown highlights the Borough’s modest share of the total taxes paid by residents each year.

Rates & TAXES

The approved 2025 budgets are reflective of the following rates and tax levels:

- No increase to real estate tax rate = 16.0 mills
- New fire tax enacted = 1.25 mills
- 3% increase to sewer rate = \$9.40 per 1,000 gal.
- No increase to stormwater rate = \$0.75 per 100 square feet of impervious area

Greencastle has the 2nd lowest real estate tax rate among Franklin County boroughs, while still providing the same, and in some cases enhanced, municipal services as other towns.

Fire Tax **ENACTED**

As approved with the 2025 General Fund budget, the Borough of Greencastle implemented a 1.25 mill fire tax to help fund local fire protection services. This new tax, authorized under Pennsylvania Borough Code, will generate approximately \$52,000 annually, which will be totally allocated to Rescue Hose Company No. 1.

For 2025, Rescue Hose requested \$127,805.68 from the Borough to cover 25% of the cost of their paid firefighter and EMT staff. Historically, the Borough has provided an annual donation of \$17,500, in addition to support for paid staff. With a total request of \$145,305.68 and no longer being able to rely on federal COVID Relief/ARPA funds, the Borough Council determined that enacting a fire tax is the most responsible and transparent funding solution.

For Borough property owners, the average impact of the 1.25 mill fire tax will be approximately \$27.17 per year, comparable to the current 1.3 mill Franklin County Library Tax, which costs an average of \$28.26 per year for all Franklin County property owners.

As illustrated in the table above, with the 2025 implementation of the 1.25 mill fire tax, Greencastle Borough has the lowest municipal fire tax rate in Franklin County.

GRANT FUNDING

As a testament to the Borough's strong determination to mitigate unnecessary tax increases, 26% of the Borough's anticipated revenues for 2025 are to be received from awarded grants and outside contributions for a projected revenue amount of **\$764,183.00**.

Awarded grants include funding for the following 2025 projects:

- ADA improvements at the intersection of Walter Ave & Route 11
- ADA ramp installation
- Updated signal controllers to be integrated at all three of the Borough's signalized intersections.

Funding sources for these projects include Pennsylvania Department of Transportation (PennDOT), Community Development Block Grants (CDBG), and Pennsylvania Department of Community and Economic Development (DCED).

Staff has and will continue to place a significant emphasis on the submittal of grants to ensure necessary projects can be executed without the need for tax increases.

2025 MAJOR PROJECTS

ADA Compliant *Curb Ramp Improvements*

Scope of Project: install 42 ADA compliant curb ramps at various locations in the SE portion of the Borough including Allison St, Leitersburg St, S. Ridge Ave, Franklin St, and S. Carlisle St

Funding: \$289,500.00 in CDBG grant funds

Project Completed: May 2025



ADA Ramp at S. Washington & Leitersburg St

Walter Avenue & Rt. 11 Intersection Improvements

Scope of Project: install pedestrian crosswalk signals, ADA ramps, reconfigure crosswalks, incorporate a left turn signal option on Rt. 11

Funding: \$286,103.00 in CDBG grant funds

Aug to End of Year - construction

Traffic Signal Improvements

Scope of Project: update the signal controllers, intersection traffic cameras, and pedestrian signals at all three signalized intersections

Funding: \$229,080.00 in PennDOT grant funds

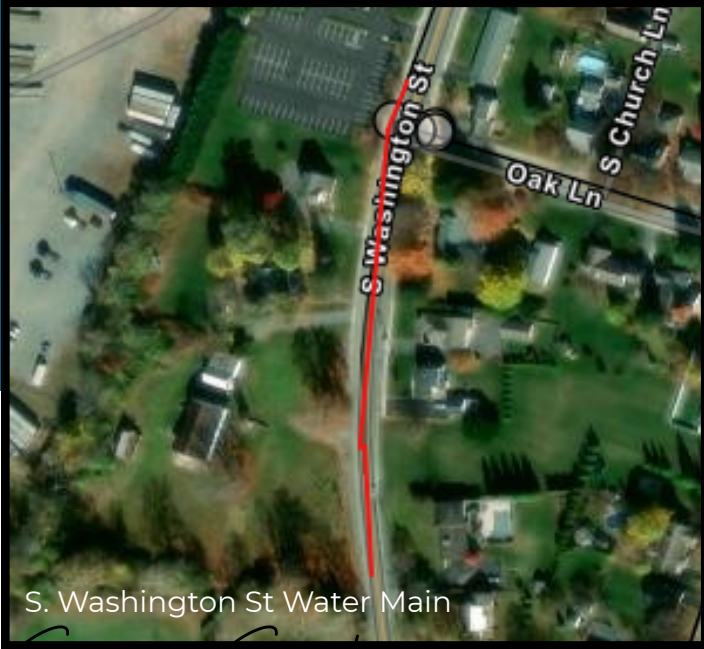

MAJOR PROJECTS 2025

S. Washington Street Water Main Replacement



Scope of Project: The Water Authority has approved the replacement of 660 LF of water main on S. Washington Street with a new 8" main starting at Oak Ln, ending north of Paddy Run

Budget: \$280,000.00

Project Schedule: Completed October 2025

Force Main Cleaning

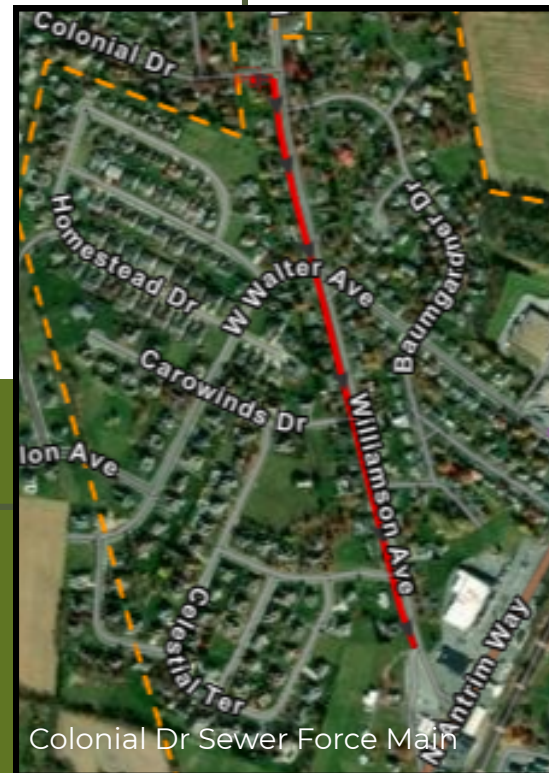

Budget: \$230,000.00

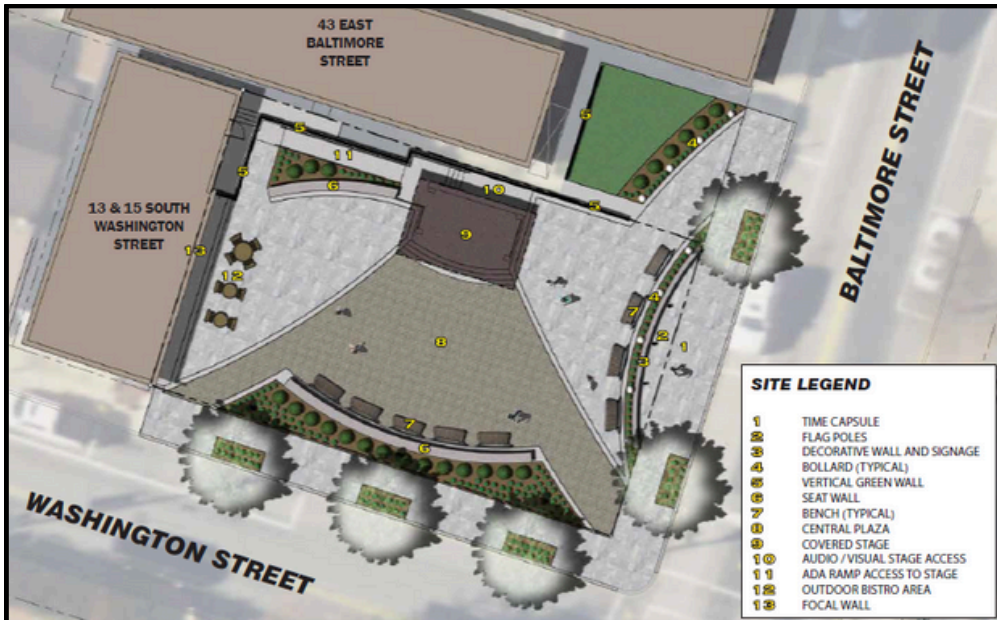
Our Vision for the Town Hall Plaza
