Carlisle Street, installing jersey barrier protection, restricting occupancy within 20 feet of the façade, and further evaluating the structural integrity of the remaining walls</li> <li>Public Works has installed barricades and closed the impacted portion of N. #### **Sewer Department Operational Updates**

- Pumped and cleaned Carlisle Street Station wet well, removing significant grease and non-biodegradable debris
- Completed annual biosolids testing with the help of the Public Works staff and sent out samples for analysis
- Continued discussions regarding the Antrim Township Inter-Municipal Agreement
- Began compiling data for the NPDES Permit renewal (due 12/2/25; permit expires 5/31/26), with Keller Engineering assisting
- Worked with Aptus Control Systems to improve blower control program and address VFD/plant fluctuations
- Removed a cedar tree that fell across the facility fence during the storm on July 16<sup>th</sup>
- Worked with APS to clean and map the Carlisle Street force main; Colonial Drive force main found to be heavily scaled (only about 20% of pipe is open), staff is evaluating options for the replacement of the impacted area
